LANDSCAPE

The weather has just been wonderful for the last few weeks. Hopefully you have had time to enjoy it. Now is the time to do a little sprucing up on your lawn and garden and also some preventive care. Some of you may have notice that the trees on Sun Valley had some major trimming. That greenbelt is shared by our neighbors to the West. There were five trees that had to be removed. They had severe rot and were a threat of falling. I know many of you think we trimmed the tree too much, but many of the branches has cracks and damage from the drought. With this work completed, we should be good for several years. Below are some things that you could do to make your yard sparkle. Even if you have a yard service, it would be worth the money to have them do some of these preventive measures.

Top 10 things to do in November

- 1. Clear up fallen leaves especially from lawns, ponds and beds.
- Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging.
- 3. Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year.
- 4. Prune roses to prevent wind-rock.
- 5. Plant out winter bedding.
- 6. Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem.
- 7. Insulate outdoor containers from frost bubblewrap works well.
- 8. Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks.
- 9. Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden.
- 10. Use a seasonal bonfire where this is allowed to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting.

Lawns

Rake fallen leaves off lawns before they block out light and moisture from the grass. Grass will continue to grow in temperatures above 5°C (41°F), so if the weather remains mild it may be necessary to trim the lawn with a mower. Ensure the cut is 3-5mm higher than in summer to prevent turf stress. On average, this means a cutting height of around 4cm (1.5in).

Mowing will help to deal with any annual weeds that have sprung up in new lawns sown earlier in the autumn.

If putting lawnmowers away for the winter, ensure they are clean and dry before storing. Also remember to drain fuel as unleaded gasoline doesn't keep, and may cause problems next year when trying to start up the machines. It's a perfect time to sharpen you blade or get a new one.

Avoid walking on lawns on frosty mornings. It can damage the grass and often leads to brown footprintshaped marks.

It is now too late to sow grass seed, but new lawns can still be laid from turf if the weather is not too cold.

Don't feed the lawn with left-over summer feeds. These contain too much nitrogen, which stimulates lush growth; at this time of year, lush growth will be vulnerable to diseases. Use an autumn lawn feed, which contains more potassium and phosphorous, to encourage hardiness and root growth instead.

It is too late to apply lawn weed killers now - effectiveness will be much reduced.

Feed Birds

Bird feeders are a great way to encourage these wonders to visit your yard. Place them where you can enjoy the show from a window or from your porch or deck. Visit your local garden center, a Wild Birds Unlimited store, or birdquest.com for a great selection of bird feeders. Deter squirrels by using a spicy birdseed such as Cole's Blazing Hot Blend Bird Seed or treating the seeds with Cole's Flaming Squirrel Seed Sauce. Birdbaths and birdhouses will also lure feathered friends to your yard.

Add Mulch

After the first frost, add a 2-inch layer of finely shredded pine bark mulch around the bases of your trees and shrubs. You can also use fallen leaves: Rake them into a pile, and chop them up with a lawn mower; then gather them, and spread them around your plants. They'll appreciate the extra protection during winter months.

Thank you for all your hard work making our neighborhood shine. With the neighborhood being 20+ years, it's important to update our lawns and flower beds. It will payoff when you are trying to sell your home or help your neighbor if their house is on the market. Curb appeal just adds dollars.

After thirteen years in prison, a good cop walks free as deep in the forest, on the altar of an abandoned church, a body cools in pale linen...





Hello Neighbors,

I would once again remind you that Roof replacements, house modifications and fencing repairs will require approval of the HOA. We have received over 140 requests for roof replacements and other storm damage repairs.

You may go to the CMA website and complete the application online for approval through the Architectural Committee using the PDF form. Be sure to include:

- 1. Name
- 2. Address
- 3. Contact phone and email
- 4. Complete_description of the work
- 5. Shingle Color and Manufacturer
- 6. Paint Color and Manufacturer
- 7. Stain Color and Samples
- 8. Estimated Start Date
- 9. Estimated Completion Date

If you require faster approval, <u>and</u> you are using a Variegated Weathered Wood style shingle for your replacement, you may email me directly at <u>john.p.thune@gmail.com</u>. Again, be sure to include:

The shingle that is referenced in the bylaws (240 lb Prestique II, Varigated, "Weathered Wood"), is no longer manufactured. There are, however, many other similar shingle types and colors that are called Weathered Wood.

Ask your contractor to use this color when providing you with a quote.

As a suggestion, take these simple precautions to protect yourself <u>before</u> hiring a contractor.

User Guidelines for Multi-Use Trails

Trails for non-motorized use have become very popular. A consequence of their success is congestion. With this, a major issue has become safety. Whether you cycle, walk, jog, skate, push a stroller or walk a dog, if you follow the same set of rules as everyone else, your experience will be safer and more enjoyable. Please follow these guidelines when using Plano's multi-use trails.

Be Courteous

All users, including bicyclists, joggers, walkers, wheelchairs, skateboarders and skaters should be respectful of other users, regardless of their mode, speed, or level of skill.



SHARE THE TRAIL

BE PREDICTABLE

Travel in a consistent and predictable manner. Always look behind before changing position on the trail.

KEEP RIGHT

Stay to the RIGHT side of the trail as is safe except when passing another user.

PASS ON THE LEFT

Pass others going in your direction on their LEFT. Look ahead and back to make sure the lane is clear before pulling out. Pass with ample separation and do not move back to the right until safely past. Faster traffic in any mode of travel is always responsible for yielding to slower and on-coming traffic.

GIVE AUDIBLE SIGNAL BEFORE PASSING

Give a clear warning signal before passing. A frequently used warning announced loudly is "PASSING ON YOUR LEFT". A clear warning signal may also be produced by bell or horn.

DON'T BLOCK THE TRAIL

When in a group, avoid using more than half the trail. Keep pets on a short leash and to the right of the trail. When stopping, move off the trail.

WEAR A HELMET

All bicyclists should wear a properly fitting helmet while riding on trails and public streets.

YIELD WHEN ENTERING & CROSSING TRAILS

When entering or crossing a trail, yield to traffic on the trail.

STOP AT STOP SIGNS

Bicyclists are required to observe all posted signs and follow all traffic laws.

REMOVE LITTER

Please do not leave glass, paper, cans or any other debris on or near a trail. If you drop something, please remove it immediately.

NIGHT USE

From dusk until dawn, bicycles should be equipped with lights. Bicycles should have a white light visible from 500 feet to the front and a red or amber light or reflector visible from five- hundred feet to the rear. Reflective clothing is recommended for all trail users at night.

HAVE YOU OUTGROWN TRAILS?

If your speed or style endangers others users, seek alternative routes better suited to you needs. Selecting the right location is safer and more enjoyable for everyone.

CITY ORDINANCES

Bicyclists are required to follow traffic laws—City Code, Ch. 12.

Dogs must be a leash no longer than 6 feet and within control of the owner at all times—City Code, Ch. 4.

Dog owners must pick up after their pets—City Code, Ch. 4.

No alcohol or open containers are allowed on park property. Permits are available for special events—City Code, Ch. 15.

City park hours are 5 a.m. to 11 p.m.—City Code, Ch. 15.
