Dear Homeowners,

LANDSCAPE

Wow, was August simply amazing this year. It is so rare that we have rain, much less record rainfall for Plano. It's so wonderful to see all the green plush lawns. The only downfall was that the weeds that were invading our flowerbeds and lawn enjoyed the gift from Mother Nature and went a bit wild. The sooner you get a handle on them, the easier to manage. Remember to pre-treat your lawns and beds the end of September for weed and pest. You will be thankful this winter and spring.

Maintenance and Updates

As our neighborhood ages, we have the pleasure of enjoying mature trees and landscapes. With that comes some responsibilities and consideration. The City of Plano revised their city codes for landscape 04/2018. Below are some that the city will enforce or you can see it on our city's website, plano.gov.

- Trees overhanging visibility easements, walks and parking areas will require maintaining the canopy at a minimum of 7-foot clearance.
- Trees overhanging a public street, drive aisles and fire lanes will require maintaining the canopy at a minimum of 14-foot clearance.
- Trees should be planted at least 5 feet from any utility line, including power lines.

Please trim your trees if they are infringing on the sidewalk or street. Also, if your trees' canopies have spread into your

> Our entrance at Parker and Browning, although many of us never use it, still needs a bit of attention. Here are some of the things we are going to address in the next few months. 1) seed the bare area under the oak trees with Fescue 2) remove the two Litex bushes by the sign 3) update median since knockout roses were removed 3 years ago due to disease 4) create a designated bed by the crepe myrtles and re-seed grass 5) mulch all areas. 6)replace rusted edging around flowerbed on Sun Valley. Based on the budget, cost of upgrades and the Board's decision, the improvements will be scheduled for this fall.

The discussion was fascinating and Linda did an expert job of getting the most out of our conversation with interesting questions and in depth information about the author. The group was especially pleased that we have read the book as the movie is coming out in August.

Our selection for September 11th is "Little Fires Everywhere" by Celeste Ng. The meeting will be hosted by Marcia Hansen at 4540 Vista Knoll Dr. from 2:00 to 3:30 PM.

Below is a synopsis of the book.

From the bestselling author of Everything I Never Told You, a riveting novel that traces the intertwined fates of the pictureperfect Richardson family and the enigmatic mother and daughter who upend their lives.

In Shaker Heights, a placid, progressive suburb of Cleveland, everything is planned - from the layout of the winding roads, to the colors of the houses, to the successful lives its residents will go on to lead. And no one embodies this spirit more than Elena Richardson, whose guiding principle is playing by the rules.

Enter Mia Warren - an enigmatic artist and single mother - who arrives in this idyllic bubble with her teenaged daughter Pearl, and rents a house from the Richardsons. Soon Mia and Pearl, become more than tenants: all four Richardson children are drawn to the mother-daughter pair. But Mia



When submitting an ACC request for staining a fence, painting your home exterior, or any other project with a color change, <u>please provide a color sample with your request or the website where the color can be</u> viewed. A detailed description of the work is also very helpful. This will help expedite approval of your project.

If you have changes to your hardscape, such as sidewalks, driveways, retaining walls and fences, these should also be submitted for review.

Also, although the ACC normally responds very quickly, you should allow a minimum of 10 days from the time you submit a completed ACC request form before commencing work.
