LANDSCAPE



I would like to wish everyone a Happy and Safe 4th of July. May and June have left everything lush and green. It will be interesting to see if the Texas heat will return in July and August. Hopefully, we will continue to get rain in these typically hot months. Below are some tips for helping your lawn stay healthy and weed free during these trying months.

Water

Like fertilizers, grass species also require different amounts of water. Making a recommendation on water is difficult because it varies so much with location, grass species and ever-changing environmental conditions.

Many experts recommend homeowners refrain from watering until grass shows initial signs of stress – such as reduced bounce-back. When you walk on your lawn and the leaves don't immediately bounce back and your steps leave an indention – it's time to water. Typically, watering one to two times a week for a total of 1-2" of water when conditions are dry is plenty. Moisture- or rain-sensing technology is a good way to avoid overwatering.

Remember to monitor **Plano's** water restrictions and watering schedule. Please be mindful with your sprinkler systems and check for leaks or faulty sprinkler heads and using water unnecessarily.

Weeds

The best way to fight weeds is by promoting warm-season grasses. Creating ideal conditions for specific warm-season grass varieties includes fertilizing and watering appropriately.

The time for pre-emergents has passed, but we can do other things to help create ideal conditions for turfgrasses. Turfgrasses can more easily outcompete weeds for resources if you have a healthy, dense turf.

Grass health will also depend on other conditions such as whether it is a high- or low-traffic area, the amount of shade or sun it receives, and mowing height. Post-emergent herbicides, such as 2,4-D, work well against broadleaf weeds such as dandelions without hurting most turfgrass varieties, but they aren't effective against clover and grassy weeds. Weed identification is very important when it comes to determining what the treatment options are. Take the weed with you to the Nursery so you get the right treatment.

If you have Dallas Grass, it will need to be dug up or killed with weed killer. This a very tenacious weed that spreads quickly so it needs to be addressed right away.

Mowing

Mowing is the best cultural practice we have for controlling weeds and increasing the density of our lawns. Grass species will play the most significant factor in mowing height, and conditions such as rain and sun will direct frequency of cutting.

Never take more than one-third of the plant's mature height throughout the season. The amount of shade or sun will also factor into how high the grass should be cut. The height should be raised about 50 percent for areas that are shady most of the time. The amount of foot traffic will also direct mower height.

Come summer, when the roots need a little more shade, kick it up to 2'' - 3'' (about 4 or 5 on your mower height setting). Once that turf gets long and starts to open up,

weed seeds get in and compete for root space. If it goes too long, those weeds will seed, and your little weed problem will become a huge mess.

Fertilize right

With fertilization, less is often more. Any nitrogen not used by your turf gets sent to your weeds and fungus. The newest turf study recommendations say a 2-1-0 ratio is plenty for St. Augustine. Most commonly, you will find a 4-1-2 or 5-1-2 ratio is easiest to find. Check the numbers on the back of the bag. If the nitrogen is 19, the phosphorous is 5, and the potassium is 9, that is basically a 4-1-2 ratio. If the bag is rated for 1000 sq. ft., using it at half rate (covering 2000 sq. ft.) will give you a spread at 10-2.5-5, more than plenty to feed your lawn. For fertilizers, I recommend Milorganite or Ladybug. Both offer great organic fertilizer that your lawn will love.

Embarking on the adventure of her life, Joy traveled from America to England and back again, facing heartbreak and poverty, discovering friendship and faith, and against all odds, finding a love that even the threat of death couldn't destroy.

In this masterful exploration of one of the greatest love stories of modern times, we meet a brilliant writer, a fiercely independent mother, and a passionate woman who changed the life of this respected author and inspired books that still enchant us and change us. Joy lived at a time when women weren't meant to have a voice and yet her love for Jack gave them both voices they didn't know they had.

At once a fascinating historical novel and a glimpse into a writer's life, Becoming Mrs. *Lewis* is above all a love story—a love of literature and ideas and a love between a husband and wife that, in the end, was not impossible at all.





ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE (ACC)

Summer projects are under way!

Remember...Exterior changes for your property, should be submitted for review to the Architectural Committee.

When submitting an ACC request for staining a fence, painting your home exterior, or any other project with a color change, <u>please provide a color sample with your request or the website where the color can be viewed.</u> This will help expedite approval of your project.

If you have changes to your hardscape, such as sidewalks, driveways, retaining walls and fences, these should also be submitted for review.

Also, although the ACC normally responds very quickly, you should allow a minimum of 10 days from the time you submit a completed ACC request form before commencing work.
