I hope everyone had a wonderful and shrubs quickly. Summer. It's hard to believe it's already September. The holidays will be here before we know it. Below are a few things you should do this fall to keep your lawn and garden heathy through the winter. You will be glad you completed your list when spring arrives and you lawn is thick and lush.

## Fertilize and Repair

In September, it is necessary to provide a balanced fertilizer, type NPK 15-15-15, but ask your local Nursery what is the correct type for your lawn. This will promote root growth and the overall health of the lawn for the coming year.

The grass has suffered a lot of games, trampling and extreme heart during the summer. Take advantage of late September or early October to renovate the peeled areas.

Once the heat has passed, you can, if you wish, lower the cutting height and mow shorter than in summer. However, during the last mowing, it is good to mow quite high (at least 5 cm). This will make your lawn more resistant to diseases and help it to leave faster in the spring.

### **Planting**

Fall planting—Begin planting trees and shrubs this month. Planting in autumn allows them time to grow roots and transition into the garden.

Water—As temperatures begin to cool, plants need less water. Adjust your watering schedule for lawns, borders, and containers. Pay close attention to containers as they tend to become waterlogged.

Color beds—Remove spent summer annuals, prepare the soil, and plant cool-weather annuals now. Add a balanced slow-release fertilizer, organic matter such as composted pine bark, and then till the bed before planting.

Pest!- Grub worms are a white, fleshy larvae that live in the ground until emerging as a beetle. leave large brown patches in the lawn that often get confused with brown patch. No matter what type of lawn you have, grub worms can be a problem. It is easy to diagnose them as you simply dig into the affected area and if you have more Leaving leaves on your lawn will than a handful, they are likely your promote disease and also choke and culprit. If the problem gets too bad, i.e., your lawn displays several larvaways to remove them....mow or infested brown patches, you might

are chinch bugs. These little critters love the heat. They typically attack lawns at the edges first, often near a side walk. Chinch bugs are treated with an insecticide spray.

I know this is quite a bit of information at once, but don't let it overwhelm you. Getting your lawn on a good watering schedule, knowing when to fertilize and being aware of what problems could arise, and simply knowing how to handle them will get your lawn lush and green in no time. That's all I have for now, but I'll be back with more information soon. Until then, happy gardening!

#### How often:

We meet every other month (odd months) falling on the second Tuesday of that month. We will meet for no longer than 2 hours. We chose to cap the number of members at 12 believing this would give everyone the opportunity to s p e a k without feeling uncomfortable. Currently we are at eleven members.

#### Where:

Meetings would occur in our homes with the person who chose the book being the facilitator and hostess. The facilitator would research and present a short bio or interesting facts about the author. The facilitator would also lead the discussion, keeping us on track.

#### **Guidelines:**

- 1. Acceptable genres include but not limited to: murder/mystery, historical fiction, non-fiction, memoirs, fiction, and biographies
- 2. Genres not acceptable: westerns, science fiction, and religion.
- 3. Length of books should be 300 400 pages or close to it. If the book is 500 pages or more the person selecting the book must present it at a meeting to discuss reasons to go to 500 pages so that the group can agree or not to read a longer book.

4.Try to finish the book selected so that you can fully participate.

5.Be prepared, read the book in advance so that you are not disappointed when the outcome during discussion is revealed.

At this point in time we have read 55 books with a mixture of historical fiction, fiction, memoirs, mysteries, non-fiction, biographies, and autobiographies.



# ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE (ACC)

Fall projects are under way!

Remember...Exterior changes for your property, should be submitted for review to the Architectural Committee.

When submitting an ACC request for staining a fence, painting your home exterior, or any other project with a color change, <u>please provide a color sample with your request or the website where the color can be viewed.</u> This will help expedite approval of your project.

If you have changes to your hardscape, such as sidewalks, driveways, retaining walls and fences, these should also be submitted for review.

Also, although the ACC normally responds very quickly, you should allow a minimum of 10 days from the time you submit a completed ACC request form before commencing work.

A complete set of the neighborhood's Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions as well as the required ACC Application Form are available on our website at <a href="http://hoppr.org/forms-documents/">http://hoppr.org/forms-documents/</a>, or you can contact our CMA Property Manager, Dan Estep, at 972-943-2856.
