

Sooley

By John Grisham

Genres: Adventure fiction, Coming-of-age story, Sports Fiction

Author Bio:

John Ray Grisham Jr. is an American novelist, attorney, politician, and activist, best known for his popular legal thrillers. His books have been translated into 42 languages and published worldwide. Grisham graduated from Mississippi State University and received a JD degree in 1981. He practiced criminal law for about a decade and served in Mississippi State House of Representatives, January 1984 to September 1990.

Grisham said the big case came in 1984, but it was not his case. As he was hanging around the court, he overheard a 12-year-old girl telling the jury what had happened to her. Her story intrigued Grisham, and he began watching the trial. He saw how the members of the jury cried as she told them about having been raped and beaten. It was then, Grisham later wrote, a story was born.

Musing over "what would have happened if the girl's father had murdered her assailants" took three years to complete his first book, *A Time to Kill.* The book was rejected by 28 publishers before Wynwood Press, an unknown publisher, agreed to give it a modest 5,000-copy printing. It was published in June 1989.

Synopsis:

In the summer of his seventeenth year, Samuel Sooleymon gets the chance of a lifetime: a trip to the United States with his South Sudanese teammates to play in a showcase basketball tournament. He has never been away from home, nor has he ever been on an airplane. The opportunity to be scouted by dozens of college coaches is a dream come true.

Samuel is an amazing athlete, with speed, quickness, and an astonishing vertical leap. The rest of his game, though, needs work, and the American coaches are less than impressed.

During the tournament, Samuel receives devastating news from home: A civil war is raging across South Sudan, and rebel troops have ransacked his village. His father is dead, his sister is missing, and his mother and two younger brothers are in a refugee camp.

Samuel desperately wants to go home, but it's just not possible. Partly out of sympathy, the coach of North Carolina Central offers him a scholarship. Samuel moves to Durham, enrolls in classes, joins the team, and prepares to sit out his freshman season. There is plenty of more mature talent and he isn't immediately needed.

But Samuel has something no other player has: a fierce determination to succeed so he can bring his family to America. He works tirelessly on his game, shooting baskets every morning at dawn by himself in the gym, and soon he's dominating everyone in practice. With the Central team losing and suffering injury after injury, Sooley, as he is nicknamed, is called off the bench. And the legend begins.



Things to Do Right Now for A Great Lawn Next Year

The pros say that late summer is when grass seeds should be planted whether starting a new lawn or nurturing an existing one. But there's a lot more to late-summer lawn care than that and time is of the essence.

Most people think that the care of your lawn begins in the spring but proper care and feeding of your lawn actually begins in the fall. As summer gives way to autumn, start to work on all of the things that need to be done in order to ensure the lawn has every advantage when things wake up in 2022. Invest a little TLC now and you'll reap what you sow come spring.

Do A Soil Test

A soil test can determine the soil's pH level, nutrient deficiencies and other factors. This will give a great deal of information about the health of the soil and how to proceed.

Reseed damaged areas of the lawn.

Experts agree that the latter half of August is the perfect time to plant grass seeds. Identify areas that need to be reseeded and use a leaf rake to spread evenly.

Strengthen your grass roots using the right fertilizer.

By strengthening the healthy grass already there will aid in a solid root system. The more you nurture the grass, the more the roots stay nourished during the winter. Look for labels that indicate which fertilizer is appropriate to which season.

Trim it, but don't mow it short.

Don't scalp the lawn at the end of the season. This misguided habit is all too common and undermines the health of the root mass. The proper mowing height is anywhere from two and a half to three inches. Make sure mower blades are sharp.

Nip weeds in the bud.

Most weeds actually germinate in the spring and complete their life cycle by the end of summer. Some weeds, however, do germinate in the summer and take root during the winter. Though not a major concern at this time, weed control should be a consideration year-round. The best defense against weeds is a strong offense. because the state of the lawn itself can determine the number of weeds.

Wean your lawn off of water so the roots dry out.

Lawns go through a biochemical process where they harden themselves off for the winter so that when freezing temperatures come, the grass can tolerate the cold and survive the winter. Part of helping the lawn to acclimate is to allow it to basically dry out a little bit.

Show your lawn some love now and watch it flourish next spring!



It's easy to submit your project request online. Simply go to hoppr.org. You will find the ACC application under "Useful Links". There you will find the CMA Management link to login or register. You can complete your ACC application and upload your supporting documents easily. The applications will be process more quickly than submitting a request on paper.

Always provide contact information, either email or phone.

Remember...These are common work items that should be submitted to the Architectural Committee for review.

- Replacement of roofs
- Exterior painting
- Pool installation
- Home additions (extra rooms, garage expansion, driveways)
- Repair/re-staining or replacing, or installing new fences
- Storage buildings, greenhouses, or workshops
- Major landscaping projects including draught resistant landscaping and water conserving turf
- Exterior radio, television or other antennas (excluding those that cannot be seen from the street
- · Retaining walls.
- Mailbox modifications

Please allow a minimum of 10 days from the time you submit a completed ACC request form before commencing work.
