



My lawn grass is to my landscape as my floor covering is to the inside of my house. Turf is the foundation on which the rest of the landscape is built. It's the surface on which my family will play, eat, entertain, and work. I want it to be functional, yet beautiful.

Of all the different grass types, only a few qualify as good turf grass choices. There are a dozen common grasses that measure up as turf grass alternatives for Texas. Only one, buffalo grass, is the true native. Unfortunately, there is no perfect grass. Some are attractive, but they can't survive cold temperatures. Others weaken in the summer heat while some can't tolerate shade.

When I purchased my home four years ago, I favored the St. Augustine that was growing beautifully on the south side of the sidewalk leading to the front door. The north side was mostly Bermuda grass. I have been adding St. Augustine sprigs every spring rather than laying new sod. So far, they have taken root and spreading nicely. Lately though, I noticed the grass was looking yellowish and not a healthy bright green. Parts of the yard were thinning out with little dead spots scattered around. Also, weeds were starting to grow and the Bermuda was slowly coming back.

I just learned that most older St. Augustine lawns are extremely susceptible to a decline-viral disease and the signs were evident in mine. It is spread to established grass on mower blades, trimmers...any tools that are used on multiple yards. There is no known chemical control. The only way to stop spreading the disease is to disinfect all equipment with a 10% solution of chlorine bleach after each use. Fat chance of that happening with my lawn mowing service! So, my fingers are crossed that the organic fertilizer applied will boost the healthy areas and create new growth. Hopefully, I won't be forced to replant with decline-resistant Raleigh St. Augustine, the virus will run its course and I will be spared the cost. I share this in case someone else is experiencing the same issues with their St. Augustine lawn; to be helpful financially and in stopping severe damage to their turf.

#### TIPS FROM THE CITY OF PLANO

#### **Prep Your Home For Summer**

As we approach the hottest months of the year, it's time to perform yearly summer maintenance. Keep your energy bills low, extend the life of your mechanical equipment and improve the overall safety of your property with these simple tips.

Keep a regular mowing schedule: Not only does regular mowing stimulate grass to grow lush and green, it can also save you money. A well maintained yard saves on the purchase of expensive equipment, tools and lawn care products.

Inspect your patio or deck: Fix cracks in driveways and walkways to eliminate tripping hazards. Wooden decks should be stained and sealed to protect from decay and splintering.

**Inspect your fence:** Repair or replace broken, missing or leaning sections to prolong the life of your fence.

Add Insulation: Install high-quality insulation to save on your energy bill. Heat and air can escape through the roof. Having attics and cavity walls insulated helps bring down electricity costs. Seal leaks: Caulking gaps and cracks around doors and windows will keep your home comfortable and energy efficient. Check your heating system: Avoid carbon monoxide leaks and improve the efficiency of your furnace with regular maintenance. The best time to fix the central heating system is when the weather is warm. Don't wait until fall to discover the furnace is not working properly. Be sure to hire a professional to service the heating and cooling system in your home.

Clean your chimney: After heavy winter use, summer is a great time to hire a professional to clean your chimney. A clean chimney reduces the risk of a chimney fire and carbon monoxide poisoning.





Inspect and remove any damaged or dead landscaping, trees or vegetation



Check pools and hot tubs for leaks



Repair cracked and broken walkways, patios and decks eliminating tripping hazards



Inspect fencing for loose, damaged or leaning sections or parts. Make necessary repairs and re-stain to prolong the life of your fence.



Stop air leaks by caulking gaps and cracks around doors and windows to be more energy efficient



Add high-quality insulation to attics and walls to lower electricity costs



Schedule air conditioning and heating system inspections to avoid carbon monoxide leaks and improve efficiency



Have your chimney professionally cleaned this summer to reduce risk of fire and carbon monoxide poisoning this fall



Clean dirt, smoke and grease build up from kitchen range hoods and air filters



Ensure fire extinguishers have not expired and are working properly

It's easy to submit your project request online. Simply go to hoppr.org. You will find the ACC application under "Useful Links". There you will find the CMA Management link to login or register. You can complete your ACC application and upload your supporting documents easily. The applications will be processed more quickly than submitting a request on paper.

Always provide contact information, either email or phone.

Remember...These are common work items that should be submitted to the Architectural Committee for review.

- Replacement of roofs
- Exterior painting
- Pool installation
- Home additions (extra rooms, garage expansion, driveways)
- Repair/re-staining or replacing, or installing new fences
- Storage buildings, greenhouses, or workshops
- Major landscaping projects including draught resistant landscaping and water conserving turf
- Exterior radio, television or other antennas (excluding those that cannot be seen from the street
- Retaining walls.
- Mailbox modifications

Please allow a minimum of 10 days from the time you submit a completed ACC request form before commencing work.
